These papers are sent on at once because Sir P．Liesching has not yet seen the letter from Sir G．Laithwaite at（64）． This letter and the following telegram at（65）have been put on this file by agreement with the South Asian Department since they follow the developments recorded in this file （summarised in the note at（63））；and although the title of the file＂Religious Disturbances＂is not appropriate to describe these last two documents which are concerned With the possibility of Sir Zafrullah Khan being forced to resign，it is perhaps as appropriate a place as any for them to be registered for the time being． 2．The letter at（64）has not yet been seen in the Foreign office and a copy should no doubt be sent to Nr．Burrows with reference to（65）on a Top Secret basis．
3．The note by the Secretary of state on the flimsy of
（64）says that no action is possible until is ．Nazimuãan
is here (i.e. for the Coronation). Presumably we should tell Sir G. Laithwaite that this is our view, express general agreement with the second and third paragraphs of his telegram at (65), and add that if he has any opportunity of expressing any of these views or hinting them to Nr. Nazimuddin without letting it appear that we are expressing views about the internal affairs of Pakistan, It will be useful if he would take this opportunity.
